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Scott Barrett is the Lenfest-Earth Institute Professor of Natural Resource Economics at Columbia University, School of International and Public Affairs & Earth Institute (2009-). He was previoulsy Professor of Environmental Economics & International Political Economy at the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies, Washington, DC (1999-2009). Before that, he was an Associate and Assistant Professor of Economics at London Business School (1988-1999). He has held visiting positions at Princeton, Harvard, and Yale universities, and at the Centre for Advanced Study, Norwegian Academy of Science and Letters. He is currently a Fellow of CESifo (Munich), the Beijer International Institute of Ecological Economics (Stockholm), and the Kiel Institute of World Economics. He is also on the advisory boards of the Mercator Research Institute on Global Commons and Climate Change (Berlin) and the Institut du Developpement Durable et des Relations Internationales (Paris). He is an Associate Editor of *Science Advances*, and on the editorial boards of many other journals.

He is the author of two books, *Environment & Statecraft: The Strategy of Environmental Treaty-Making* (2003) and *Why Cooperate? The Incentive to Supply Global Public Goods* (2007), both published by Oxford University Press. He is also co-editor (with Karl-Göran Mäler and Eric S. Maskin) of *Environment and Development Economics: Essays in Honor of Sir Partha Dasgupta* (2014), also published by Oxford University Press.
